

Dear Lazybrook,

I certainly hope that you all have had a wonderful, wonder filled Christmas and New Year. And, I hope that any of you that had a "real" tree has dropped it off to be converted to mulch. Our nearest site for that is: 4200 West T.C. Jester, at the T. C. Jester Park. That continued to January 9th, but if you missed that, you may place it at the curb on tree waste collection day (for N. Lazybrook that is the month of January and the third Thursday or the 20th; for S. Lazybrook that is January, the fourth Monday which is the 24th). You are asked by the City to please remove tinsel, lights, ornament, tree stands, etc before you put it out.



I received a recycling book from 2008 entitled <u>Be Green</u> so I'm going to share something from it for the next few articles. It quotes the EPA as saying, "Thirty six States are anticipating water shortages by 2016. Yet, the average American uses more than 100 gallons of water each day." And the NRDC as stating, "A family of four using low-flow shower heads instead of full-flow models can save about 20,000 gallons of water per year."

Getting low water use toilets is also an astounding savings of water (and money). Some ways to save water saves money without costing any - like turning off the water when brushing your teeth or washing your face and fixing leaks when they first start (rather than putting it off). As of December 31, 2010, there were nine active listings, one option pending, and two pending listing in Lazybrook.



Of the 9 active listings prices run from \$230,000 to \$449,000 with an average square footage of 2,029 and an average per square foot asking price of \$159.18. The most expensive is a 4/3 with 2,250 square feet completely remodeled (This is the foreclosure that sold for \$165,000 in the last report). The least expensive active is a 3/1.5 with 1,671 square feet built in 1956. The lowest per square foot asking price is \$137 and the highest is \$199.

The Option Pending was last listed at \$449,900 is a 4/3 with 3,102 square feet that was on the market only 15 days.

In Pending the two properties average 3/1.5 bedrooms with 1,607 square feet.

Lazybrook had three closing between October 30, 2010 and December 31, 2010. The sales prices were \$270,000, \$305,000 & \$409,050.

Yard of the Month

December 2010



The home of Jaime and Nina Cotero at 2342 Brookmere is the December yard of the month in Lazybrook. This yard is next door to last month's "Yard of the Month" and this month we have another new house which was built and first occupied in 2002. Jaime and Nina spent several months away from home this year but arrived back in August.

On arrival back in their home, Nina made a "honey do" list for Jaime. The yard was in bad shape and Nina's list included a lot of projects in the yard. Nina wanted the flower beds rejuvenated. Jaime went out 290 to a stone yard and bought some stones for a border. The stones are sandstone and as soon as Jaime finished the first bed, Nina said "good job" and asked Jaime to build another stone border.

Across the front of the house Autumn Encore Azaleas are blooming profusely. The blooms are a coral color. In front of the azaleas near the sandstone border the Cotero's have planted some very hearty looking begonias and some white and pink cyclamen.

On the other side of the front door, dwarf Yaupons are planted along the side of the sidewalk nearest the house. Two new Autumn Encore Azaleas have been recently added behind the Yaupons. The decorative metal fence behind these plants has been taken down and is being sandblasted and powder coated and should be back in place within a week or two. Across the sidewalk toward the street, a large bed with the sandstone border is filled with colorful Pansies and Kale as well as a few Snapdragons. One large Sago palm is the large plant in the bed.

This yard features two of the biggest Pine trees in Lazybrook as well as a Persimmon tree which has no leaves right now but it does have ripe Persimmons, some of which have already fallen to the ground. Nina was very pleased about being selected "Yard of the Month" and Jaime said she had already put the news on her Facebook page.



January 2011



We selected the home of **Kenny and Sheryl Michalak at 1823 Crystal Court** for yard of the month for January 2011. They have lived in this house for 30 years and Kenny lived next door with his parents 19 years before that for a total of 49 years in Lazybrook.

The yard was landscaped last February by a company called Landstar which Kenny also uses for landscaping at his business. The landscape design includes curved raised beds on each side of the sidewalk. The beds are bordered with three layers of moss rock. They have planted Nandina, Indian Hawthorne and a bold display of colorful Petunias, Snapdragons and Alyssum. This same combination of colorful Petunias, Snapdragons and Alyssum is repeated in the planter box across the right hand side of the house.

Two large Sago palms are featured in the center of the bed on each side of the yard. To the far right a large Post Oak tree at the corner of the house is surrounded by the same moss rock border and the same colorful combination of Pansies, Snapdragons and Alyssum.

Along the house and also in front of the planter box, the landscaper has created an area covered with River rock which protects the foundation and provides good drainage.

Small bits of exercise go a long way

Hope you all had a wonderful Holiday season and you were able to tame your stress and enjoy your family and friends more this holiday than the previous. It's that time of year when you might consider how will you fit exercise into your busy life? Whether it is stretching, cardio, or strength training there is a way to make it work. We all have the thought of were did the time go. It is a common question I hear often from my clients. We pack so many things in our day we forget to relax even for a minute. Lack of time is the most common excuse for not having a decent fitness routine. But do you realize the time it took you to check your email you could fit in a good workout. I'm not talking giving up 60 minutes, all you need is 10.

Liz Noelcke, a Spark people contributor. Which is a great web site for health and fitness information has some great suggestions of how to make a fitness routine work even if you do small daily burst of movement.

Just10?

Forget the "all or nothing" mentality when it comes to exercise. Fitness does not live or die by 60- minute workouts; there is a middle ground. Short spurts of exercise, when they accumulate, have been shown to share similar benefits of longer workouts.

Easier than you think

Treat these 10 minutes like you would a regular workout. Take 1-2 minutes to warm up and get the muscles ready, including stretching. Follow with at least 7 minutes of exercise at a medium or high intensity. Then make sure to include a 60-second cool down.

Since its brief, it's important to work at a fairly high intensity to

obtain all of the benefits. Work at raising your heart and respiration rates. Just like regular workouts, try to include cardio, strength training and flexibility work in your routine. Either knock out all three during the 10-minutes, or plan a 10-minute segment for each area.


Example: Push out 10 minutes of cardio on the stationary bike. For strength, do push-ups, wall sits, or lift dumbbells. For flexibility, it's helpful to just stretch every day. Work different muscle groups and keep it simple. After 10 minutes you will feel healthier and be on your way to developing solid fitness habits.

But I still don't have time

It only takes 30 minutes a day, broken up into manageable chunks of 10. Start with a quick exercise when you wake up. The second session? A lunch break is possibly the perfect time to re-energize and get the blood flowing again. The last 10 minute blitz could come in the evening, even while you are watching TV. It's an ideal way to involve the family as well. Go for a power walk after dinner or ride bikes with the kids.

It's all about convenience; if you try, you can fit exercise into your schedule no matter where you are. Do it at home or work, outside or in the living room. Start building exercise spurts into your daily routine and you'll start feeling more energized and positive about your day. The healthier and happier life is closer than you think. Call me today.
