

For instance, please flatten your corrugated cardboard, even if it's a little box. And, even squish your cans and plastic as you are able. When the city has so many tons of recyclables to carry around, every little bit of space that we can save for them saves our money and their effort.

Also, the city only has markets for plastics numbered one (1) through five (5) and seven (7). When you send something numbered six (6) or styrofoam, it has to be removed from the stream of recycling and placed in the garbage. That takes money and time to do.

The other items that go into the green bin are: magazines, newspaper, catalogs, office paper, unwanted mail, phone books, aluminum cans and tin cans, used oil in clean, screw-top container. (can be original container)

Vehicle Burglary Prevention Tips

- Lock your valuables and electronics in trunk or take them in your house
- · Remove all interior valuables from plain view
- · Lock your doors and roll up all windows
- Return to the store/office/house and call police if anyone looks or acts suspicious. Do not continue to your vehicle
- BE AWARE of your surroundings
- Do not jeopardize your safety for convenience
- At home, if possible, put your car in a garage or at least in the driveway
- Park only in well-lighted areas

I encourage everyone to install motion activated flood lights for their driveways and parking areas. If anyone needs help, we have volunteers that will help install lights if you choose to purchase them.

As of October 29, 2010, there are eight active listings, one option pending, and one pending listing in Lazybrook.



Of the 8 active listings prices run from \$224,900 to \$449,000 with an average square footage of 2,126 and an average per square foot asking price of \$160.67. The most expensive is a 4/3 with 3,102 square feet completely remodeled with a pool. The least expensive active is a 3/1.5 with 1,671 square feet built in 1956. The lowest per square foot asking price is \$144 and the highest is \$207.

The Option Pending is a 4/2 with 2,120 square feet that was on the market only 20 days. This 4/4 home was completely remodeled by City Cottage Builders.

In Pending is a 3/2 with 1,835 square feet. This property had been on the market for 6 months, came off for a couple of weeks, and then went under contract the first day back on the market. Lazybrook had seven closing between August 28, 2010 and October 29, 2010.

Average Sales Price: \$299,571 Average Square Feet: 1,971 3.29 bedrooms, 2.14 baths

Average Per Square Foot Sales Price: \$152.03

The most expensive property sold was \$400,000; the least expensive was \$165,000. The \$165,000 is the foreclosure we have been watching for several months - the buyer made a good deal and is doing a serious remodel and add-on. Three of the seven sales included Seller contribution to closing costs (\$5,000 & \$5,400 & \$8,000)...

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Yard of the Month

October 2010

The yard of Pat Lero at 2314
Brooktree is the yard of the
month for October 2010. Pat and
her husband bought the house in
1986 so she has lived on Brookmere in Lazybrook for 24 years.

Pat does all her own yard work including planting, designing and mowing. She does get someone to do the edging. The front yard is home to three large trees. In the center are two Red Oaks and off near the driveway there is a Burr Oak. The trees were there when Pat and her husband moved to Lazybrook. They put the new front sidewalk in about 10 years ago. It is made of pressed concrete and resembles flagstone in color as



well as the surface texture. The sidewalk curves from the driveway to the front entrance to the home.

Earlier this year Pat reduced the size of some of the beds, specifically the one around the Red Oaks. Some of the original Azaleas (we think they are Formosa) which were there when they moved in are still planted between the sidewalk and the house. Pat has added some Encore azaleas closer to the front door. In addition there are some pink and some red Knockout Roses near the end of the house toward the driveway. One Caldwell Pink old rose is planted by the driveway.

All the beds except for the bed around the Red Oak are bordered with some beautiful rocks that Pat and her husband brought from their farm in Flatonia about 12 years ago. These rocks are unusual. They are a reddish brown color and they are smooth but not as smooth as River Rock. Each rock is about 5 or 6 inches long and almost as wide. These rocks add a very special touch to the borders of the beds.

Other plants which are in the beds in front of the house include two Gardenias, Aztec grass, Giant Lirope, Flax Lily and at the end, a Yellow Rose of Texas. Near the front door, Pat has selected a 3 foot tall Double Red Camelia and planted it in an ornate terra cotta pot which has aged to a beautiful mossy color.

Between the two large trees and just in front of the sidewalk, Pat and her husband placed a bench that they bought in Schulenberg. The bench has cast aluminum arms and legs which include an image of a large American eagle. The slats on the back of the bench look like stripes on a flag and a cast aluminum rectangle with stylized stars is attached to the upper left corner of the back so the back of the bench looks like the American flag. Pat said the bench was her husband's favorite spot before he died 3 ½ years ago.

On a Saturday morning at 8 am, I was driving by the house and I saw Pat in the yard planting yellow Chrysanthemums in the bed around the Burr Oak. I stopped and asked her if we could select her yard for "yard of the month." She responded that all of her hard work had paid off. Pat had placed three wooden pumpkins around the front of the Burr Oak tree. Each pumpkin has the name of one of Pat's granddaughters.

November 2010

For November, we selected the home of Betty Allen at 2338 Brookmere for "yard of the month." Betty has lived at this address since 1990 but because of foundation problems with the original house, she and her former husband decided to tear down the house and divide the property into two lots. The new house was completed in 2002 and Betty moved into it 2003. This year she added a double garage and above the garage she added a huge quilt room where she will keep all her quilting machines and supplies and where she make quilts. In the photograph, the new addition is everything to the left of the porch.



The old driveway was a single lane and the new driveway is double. The new driveway required that a large oak tree be taken down. The tree was already dying in places and when they cut it down they discovered that the tree was hollow so Betty feels lucky they cut it down before it fell down. Betty had the old tree ground into mulch which she uses on her flower beds.

After the new addition, Betty asked the man who takes care of her irrigation system to supervise the installation of some new landscaping. She already had salmon/pink Encore Azaleas across the front. They are blooming now and Betty says she has some azalea blooms almost all year long. A new sidewalk from the front step to the driveway is very nicely curved and gets wider as it gets near the step. Betty selected some flagstone for the border around some new beds. She wanted the edge of the beds to be neat yet she wanted them to have a casual appearance. In the beds she selected some Crotons for color and she also added purple fountain grass, variegated Lirope and some Foxtail fern. There are pink and red Pentas in the bed in front of the sidewalk. In the large front bed a very large moss rock about five feet long is placed in front of the Azaleas. The rock divides the color are. On one side Betty planted snapdragons and on the other side she planted purple Fountain Grass. She now has three Milkweed plants which the Monarch caterpillars love to eat.

Just last week Betty found a 12 – 15 foot tall Shumard Oak tree on sale at Home Depot. The Shumard Oak tree is one of the largest southern red oak trees. It grows moderately fast and is a handsome shade tree and is deciduous. Shumard Oak trees have shiny, dark green leaves, and the bark is gray and smooth. Shumard Oak trees tolerate poor soil and drought conditions, especially after they are established. The outstanding deep crimson-red fall color produced by the Shumard Oak is an excellent reason to plant this species. The new Shumard Oak is planted near the center of the front yard. Off to the right, an older Hickory tree is producing Hickory nuts – more than the squirrels can eat for the first time.

Jaycee Park Update

Now that the cooler weather is here we will be getting more people coming to the park to play, picnic and have celebrations. I just wanted to ask everyone that happens to be at the park to help be the eyes (and voice) for the neighborhood if you are out there and see someone not respecting the rules of our neighborhood park. Some of the things that you could help with are:

* If you see someone littering, ask them to pick it up or to put it in an empty trash can instead of next to a full one. We can help to educate the people who visit our neighborhood park about the importance of picking up after themselves.

Call the HPD non-emergency number (713) 884-3131 if you see:

- A car parked in the park
- See/smell someone doing drugs in the park
- Someone in the park after hours (the posted hours are 6am-11pm
 - **All the park rules are posted at the park

Here is a great example of taking of one of our neighbors being very proactive:

One of the our neighbors that regularly walks his dogs at Jaycee Park recently confronted a chronic litterer. The man would come to the park often and around the same times and ALWAYS throw his trash on the ground as well as spit huge piles of tobacco next to a bench on the concrete pad (just inches away from the grass). Well, one afternoon this resident picked up the empty bottle which the man had just thrown on the ground and tapped on his car window and asked the guy why he would litter when there was a trash can just a few feet away. The resident asked "Don't you care about this park and keeping it and Houston clean?" The man eventually apologized to the resident for his actions. The resident then persistently called the HPD non-emergency number, left a message at the Heights Storefront and notified me. I sent a message to the Parks and Recreation Department reporting the hours that the person littering was typically at the park and they dispatched a park ranger to be there for one week within those hours. The Result: the littering man has not been back to the park. Why would he if he is knew he was going to be held accountable for littering every time he was there?

Our hope: Little by little, people will get the message that if they want to do these kinds of things they will have to go to another park. Maintaining the kind of park you would like to visit is up to all of us.

It is up to all of us to help make sure the rules of the park are followed (they are posted on the big green signs). HPD and the Parks Department cannot not do it all for us because they are not there, but they appreciate us being the eyes at the park and they will support us the best that they can.

Some trees have been cut by Centerpoint on our medians under the wires in the high line right-of way. These were some planted years ago, including a very nice live oak on 18th and several Crape Myrtles. The Parks Department warned me this might happen. My plan is to extend the wildflower area on T. C. Jester about 30 feet and to add a new one on 18th near Lazybrook Baptist Church as a replacement for the trees. I will announce on the Lazybrook e-mail network when volunteers are needed to plant seeds.

Plans are in motion to add the last of the trees in the medians. This will be on West T. C. Jester near 610. Also, two trees died on 18th, and those will be replaced.

Now is the time to plant wildflower seeds. Choose a sunny place. Poppies of all kinds do well, also Cornflowers. You buy mixes in garden stores, or check **wildseedfarms.com**. Their Texas-Oklahoma Mix is what we used on T.C.Jester.

If you enjoy wildflowers, check out the bee and butterfly garden at 11th Street Park.



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

- If any home has won the same award 3 consecutive years, they cannot win in that category during the 4th year. They are eligible for the Hall of Fame award the 4th year.


