Well Hello Neighbors! Is it hot enough for everyone out there? What a summer of high temperatures. I used it as another excuse not to exercise. Shame on me;o).




#### **Beautification**

#### **Good News!**

Thanks to an allocation from Houston Parks a Recreation Department and CM Stardig (Thanks HPARD and CM Brenda Stardig!), we will be able to build a new playground at Jaycee Park. It will be bigger and with much more variety (and no rust!). The splashpad and playground will become a reality the spring of 2011. Installation plans are being made and finalized now by the Houston Parks Board. We have come a very long way in improving this park! Thanks for donating, volunteering and coming to events. Your efforts have made a huge difference.



#### Paver Push, now until September 25

The personalized pavers (bricks) are now our priority as they will be placed in a seating plaza near the splashpad and play-ground. With as much accuracy as possible, we need to let Houston Parks Board know how many pavers and the sizes our neighborhoods and surrounding businesses want in our park so we can help fund and plan the seating plaza. As of August 29, 2010 there are ten active listings, two option pending, and two pending listing in Lazybrook.

Of the 10 active listings prices run from \$229,000 to \$449,000 with an average square footage of 2,139.5 and an average per square foot asking price of \$157.64. The most expensive is a 3/2.5 with 2,418 square feet built in 1968. The least expensive active is a 3/2 with 1,418 square feet built in 1955.

The two in Option Pending are both in Section 2. The asking prices are \$254,900 and \$409,900 (this one completely redone).

In Pending we find the least expensive listing from last newsletter (and this) is a 3/2 built in 1958 with 1,436 square feet. This property is a foreclosure, definitely needs work and I suspect it was priced to created a bidding war. The property went under contract in 7 days but has not yet closed. The other Pending was on the market for only 7 days and is scheduled to close mid-September.

Lazybrook had five closing between July 1, 2010 and August 27, 2010.

Average time on the market 112 days (fewest 5, longest 296)

Average Sales Price: \$334,600 Average Square Feet: 2,353 3.4 bedrooms, 2.4 baths

Average Per Square Foot Sales Price: \$142.18

The most expensive property sold was \$415,000; the least expensive was \$288,000. Two of the five sales included Seller contribution to closing cost (\$2,500 & \$3,400) and a third had Seller repair contribution of \$6,925.

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#### **Walking Safety Tips - A Successful Start**

I got some really great feed back on my article in last month's newsletter which focused on a walking program for all. Are we ready to let go of the dog days of summer? Iknow I am. Yet it has been amazing how many of you I have seen walking around the neighborhood this past month. This tells me we are committed to being a healthier and happier community in spite of this heat.

Now that you have some idea about how to start a walking program and have some idea of your technique, let's talk about walking safely in and around the neighborhood.

Walking outside is a great way to enjoy some fresh air and get some exercise at the same time. Before you head out the door here are some safety tips you may want to consider.

#### Find a buddy.

It can make the time more fun and motivating. But more importantly there is safety in numbers. If you cannot find a buddy that day let someone know what time you will be back and the route you are walking.

#### Wear clothes that are light colored

if walking early morning or ate evening. There are many clothes that have reflective materials built into them from shoes to shorts hats etc.

This will help oncoming traffic see you and walk on well-lit treets as much as possible.

#### Walk facing traffic.

Especially if there are no side walks the rules f the road say walk against the traffic. This way you can see the oncoming cars or any potential danger coming your way.

#### Vary your route.

This is important for safety and enjoyment. It is uch more interesting to experience different surroundings and great way to meet your neighbors. This keeps anyone from memorizing your route.

#### Be aware of drivers.

Do not assume that a driver can see you or hat they know the rules of the road. Be cautious of driveways. ost drivers are looking for oncoming cars not walkers.

#### Be aware of your surrounding.

Watch for cracks, holes, cars and bikers. You get the point, it can be very easy to trip and fall and especially dangerous if you are by yourself.



Here are a few things every walker should bring or not bring.

#### What to bring.

Carry pepper spray and a phone with an alarm. And walking stick of some sort in case you need to fend off a dog. Take muffin with you, she needs the exercise too and it keeps you safe. Always carry your I.D. in case of injury.

#### What not to bring.

Do not wear any jewelry, expensive watches or headphones. They can prevent you from hearing oncoming traffic or someone behind you. Pay attention to your surroundings. Your safety deserves it.

So, have fun, get out and walk. This will make your experience fun and enjoyable and most of all safe.

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#### **Yard of the Month**

#### August 2010



We selected the yard at **1830 Seamist Court** as yard of the month for August. This month's yard of the month is owned by **Nancy Piwonka** who has updated the exterior of the house as well as the landscape.

A new sidewalk from the street has one step half way up to accommodate the gentle slope in the yard. As the sidewalk approaches the house it makes a sharp right turn to go around a new planter box about three feet tall made of the same brick as the house. In front of the planter box, the owner has placed a beautiful square glazed clay pot about 3 ½ feet tall in which she has planted butterfly iris. This pot is a focal point for the landscape. The planter box creates a semi-private area near the front door. The planter box is planted with asparagus fern which is very lush even in the August heat. Behind the planter box and before the porch Ms. Piwonka has created a maintenance free area with the ground covered with gray rocks. This rock area is a very nice complement to the gray colored flagstone which is used to pave the porch.

In the landscape from the driveway to the planter box across the front of the house are five Liropetalum plants. Stepping stones in front of the Liropetalum provide a walkway from the driveway to the front sidewalk. In front of the stepping stones the landscape features Prostrate Juniper planted along the front of the curved bed. In the center of the bed a Holly tree about 12 feet tall is becoming established. Starting with the area around the large glazed pot and continuing on to the other side of the sidewalk are some Dwarf Mexican Petunia plants which are also called Ruellia. This plant is designated a Texas Superstar on the Aggie Horticulture website because it is a spectacular, low-growing, heat tolerant perennial with profusions of violet flowers. The Ruellia is blooming nicely in August.

Across the front of the porch, the owner has planted some Horsetail Reed which is a plant which is increasingly recommended by garden designers who are searching for a minimalist design. The horsetail consists of many reed-like segmented green tubes that grow straight up to a height of four feet. Attractive black and gray bands are found at both ends of each segment. This plant will spread easily.

At the corner of the front porch is a beautiful Japanese Yew which is very adaptable to our area. The Yew is about 7 feet tall.

#### September 2010



We have observed the house at **2218 Brooktree** since late 2007 when the house went into foreclosure. At that time the house and the landscape was a disaster. The front sidewalk was gone and the indention where it used to be was filled with dead sod. Whatever plants were there were overgrown or dead.

Less than three years after **Vonda and Sean Bonte** bought the run down property in December 2007, the house has been completely remodeled with new siding, new roof, new windows, new carport, a new wrought iron gate across the driveway, new gameroom/entertainment area in the back yard and a new salt water swimming pool, new outdoor kitchen, three pallets St. Augustine sod and new landscaping. The house was not habitable when they bought the house but they started the remodeling process and moved into the house on July 1, 2008. The Bonte's have two sons, Kenneth age 14 and Mitchell age 12. The two boys do the lawn maintenance. Sean who is an electrician did a lot of the remodeling work himself. Vonda grew up in Lazybrook. Her parents live on Watercrest.

Today this home stands out in Lazybrook as a prime example of what updating can do to a 1960's Lazybrook house. The new landscape was designed and planted by the homeowners. They purchased all the plants in the neighborhood at Lowes, Home Depot and Garden World. When Vonda and Sean went looking for plants, they wanted plants native to the area and plants that were maintenance free. They chose five Italian Cypress trees about four feet tall and spaced them across the front of the house. They created curved beds and in the beds they planted a variety of plants including Dwarf Indian Hawthorne, Variegated Pittosporum, Mexican Heather and Foxtail Fern. At the left end of the bed they planted a tall Callistemon or Bottlebrush and at the right end of the bed near the driveway they planted a Sago Palm. Across the front of the beds, they planted clumps of Aztec Grass which is a variety of Giant Liriope with very distinctive green and white striped foliage. Their St. Augustine grass is greener than any other yard on Brooktree and when asked about how they kept it so green, Vonda an Sean said they watered a lot but they do not fertilize the St. Augustine. The sidewalk in the front yard is new and connects the driveway with the front door. As the concrete curves toward the door the sidewalk gradually gets wider until it forms a welcoming entrance to the home.

The driveway has been widened by adding about a foot of white gravel on each side of the existing driveway. Sean has started gathering the pine straw which falls from the large pine trees in the front yard. He is wisely using the straw as mulch in the flower beds. This is a mulch which is free, attractive and very effective in controlling weeds.


