Hello Neighbors – I am keeping a close eye out my kitchen window at all you new walkers/runners. So far I am still just gazing out and making promises to my 1st Lady Richard that I will join you all very soon. My apologies for the removal of the tree swing. We took it to the beach house. Now let me get on to more serious matters.

I am settling into my responsibilities as club president. It is harder than it looks and again I want to thank Richard Akin and his trusty sidekick, Adina, for filling the position all these years. Our March Civic Club meeting had two major ideas come forward.

First was mowing the TC Jester wildlife area between 610 and Ella. I researched the last vote held November 18, 2008. At that meeting after mow/not mow reasons were heard. 90+ Lazybrookers attended and 73 voted for NOT mowing. The

overwhelming majority voted to keep the naturescape supporting a habitat for butterflies, lizards, bees, turtles, toads, possums, birds and other animals starved for a natural habitat inside the loop. The park has 1000+ saplings reaching each year closer to the sky and the not mowers want to give them a chance to grow to maturity. We will continue to keep the edges mowed and the strips cut across to join the walking trail at the top of the hills. I will promote organized plantings of additional wild flower areas similar to the beautiful wild flower area under the power lines on TC Jester which came back beautifully again this year to appease the few wanting to mow. I dig in the dirt over there and the soil is fantastic due to the naturalized self mulching. Lazybrookers want to give this natural area a foothold for future generations.

Successful Tree Planting

50 volunteers came together ready to plant over 150 trees. After a breakfast provided by realtor, Sharon Ettinger, and a brief tree planting demonstration by one of the foresters, we went to work and planted all the trees in about an hour and a half! We had volunteers from Timbergrove, Lazybrook, Heritage Creek, Timbergrove Point, Oak Forest and even 1 from Spring Branch that read about the planting in the newspaper and 2 from Humble that work in the area. We planted a mix of Shumard oaks, 'Texas' redbud, red maple, hickory, blackgum, Mexican plum, pine and cedar elm.

Timbergrove resident, Ben Crabb, hauled out the watering tank in his pickup truck and gave the trees their first watering and continues to care for them. Please stop by the park and check them out whenever you get a chance. They really have given the park a softer and more welcoming look.

Yard of the Month

April 2010



We had many beautiful yards to choose from this month but after driving every street in Lazybrook, we finally came back to our own block and selected the home of **Dennis and Vickie Krolczyk** for April Yard of the Month.

Dennis and Vickie have lived at **2011 Willowmoss Ct** for seventeen years and they do all their own landscaping and planting. They even put the landscape brick around their flower beds. Their design of this feature in the yard is very graceful and presents a very nice appearance from the street. This yard is more beautiful during April than any other part of the year because the Azaleas were in full bloom. Across the entire front of the house, the Krolczyk's have white GG Gerbing Azaleas and in the large bed on the right side of the sidewalk they have a large mass of Formosa Azaleas which are covered with dark pink colored blooms. Near the right corner of the house in front of the GG Gerbing azaleas, Vickie and Dennis have planted some smaller Azaleas which have salmon colored blooms and near the sidewalk around the large Pine tree they have some light pink Encore Azaleas and some Agapanthus.

All the Azaleas are very neatly trimmed. Vickie says that she trims them immediately after they finish blooming to avoid cutting off next years blooms. In front of the large window just to the right of the front door the Krolczyk's have planted boxwoods and variegated Aztec grass is planted in front of the bed along the sidewalk. A single Firespike which is still recovering from the freeze is planted behind the Boxwoods.

A neatly trimmed Japanese Yew is planted near the front door and a brightly colored pot of Impatiens is near the door. Cast Iron plants fill the space between the driveway and the side of the house.

The photo shows the beautiful mature Water Oak, Red Oak and Pine trees that surround the house.

May 2010



For May we selected the yard at **2019 Sea King** for Yard of the Month owned by **Jennifer and David Bowes**. I was surprised when Jennifer told me that the landscapers just finished putting in the new landscaping the day before I showed up to select the yard of the month. David thought they were not quite ready to be selected since the new plantings will look better after they mature a bit. I agree with David that the yard will improve over the summer but it is great now and reflects the kind of landscaping that make our Lazybrook houses look great.

The Bowes' selected Garden Jules, a landscape firm to design and install their new plants. All the plants that bloom will have white blooms and a few of them are already blooming. The front yard has a large maple tree and a pecan tree. Two other trees were lost or damaged badly by Hurricane Ike and they have been replaced with Laurel Oak trees. These trees are a little faster growing than Live Oaks and have a canopy which is not as full which the Bowes believe will avoid future hurricane damage.

An Almond Verbena (Aloysia virgata) is prominently planted at the corner of the front porch in a bed which extends even further from the foundation. This extension has very large beautiful moss rock around the outside perimeter of the bed. Near the garage on the Seaspray side of the house, Jennifer and David selected a Natchez Crepe Myrtle for the feature plant to go in an extension of the bed which also has large and beautiful moss rock around it. The Almond Verbena blooms are wonderfully fragrant and will provide a pleasant welcome to the Bowes' front porch.

Five frost proof Gardenia plants and several Ducher roses (a china rose) are included in the front flower bed as well as an espaliered Little Gem Magnolia. A Wimbei Ligustrum is the feature plant at the end of the house opposite the porch. Clusters of Salvia which will produce white blooms and White Pentas are planted in the front bed. White blooming verbena is planted on each side of the sidewalk which leads to the front porch. A Starshooter (looks like a green grass with white flowers) is planted at the end of the front porch. Along the Seaspray side of the yard the bed has new Citrus Jasmine along the back of the bed and Serissa Kowloon which is a variegated plant near the front. More white Pentas are included in this bed.

One special environmentally friendly feature of the Bowe's new landscape is their Pine Straw mulch. All the new beds are mulched with Pine Straw. After a rain or a few waterings the pine straw will appear very natural and when it decomposes it will provide nutrients for the bed. The landscaping company furnished the pine straw for the Bowes' beds but Pine Straw is available free along the curb in nearby neighborhoods on the day before trash pickup.

THINGS YOUR FRIENDLY NEIGHBORHOOD BURGLAR WON'T TELL YOU:

- 1. Thanks for letting me come in to use the bathroom, love those flowers. That tells me you have taste ... And taste means there are nice things inside. Those yard toys your kids leave out always make me wonder what type of gaming system they have.
- 2. Yes, I really do look for newspapers piled up on the driveway. And I might leave a pizza flyer in your front door to see how long it takes you to remove it. Keep mail box empty.
- 3. If decorative glass is part of your front entrance, don't let your alarm company install the control pad where I can see if it's set. That makes it too easy.
- 4. A good security company alarms the window over the sink. And the windows on the second floor, which often access the master bedroom-and your jewelry. It's not a bad idea to put motion detectors up there too.
- 5. It's raining, you're fumbling with your umbrella, and you forget to lock your door-understandable. But understand this: I don't take a day off because of bad weather.
- 6. I always knock first. If you answer, I'll ask for directions somewhere or offer to clean your gutters. (Don't take me up on it.)
- 7. Do you really think I won't look in your sock drawer? I always check dresser drawers, the bedside table, and the medicine cabinet.
- 8. Here's a helpful hint: I almost never go into kids' rooms.
